Mac startup key combinations

Learn about the Mac features and tools that you can access by holding down one or more keys during startup.

To use any of these key combinations, press and hold the keys immediately after pressing the power button to <u>turn on your Mac</u>, or immediately after your Mac begins to restart. Keep holding until the described behavior occurs.

If your Mac is using a <u>firmware password</u>, all of these key combinations are disabled, except as noted below.

Command (黑)-R: Start up from the built-in <u>macOS Recovery</u> system. Or use Option-Command-R or Shift-Option-Command-R to start up from macOS Recovery over the Internet. <u>macOS Recovery installs different versions of macOS</u>, depending on the key combination you use while starting up. If your Mac is using a <u>firmware password</u>, you're asked to enter the password.

Option (\sim): Start up to <u>Startup Manager</u>, which allows you to choose other startup disks or volumes, if available. If your Mac is using a <u>firmware password</u>, you're asked to enter the password.

Option-Command-P-R: Reset NVRAM or PRAM. If your Mac is using a <u>firmware password</u>, it ignores this key combination or starts up from macOS Recovery.

Shift (1): Start up in safe mode.

D: Start up from the built-in <u>Apple Hardware Test</u> or <u>Apple Diagnostics</u> utility, depending on your Mac model. Or use Option-D to start up from this utility over the Internet.

N: Start up from a NetBoot server, if your Mac supports network startup volumes. To use the default boot image on the server, hold down Option-N instead.

Command-S: Start up in <u>single-user mode</u>. This key combination requires <u>macOS High Sierra</u> or earlier.

T: Start up in <u>target disk mode</u>.

Command-V: Start up in verbose mode.

Eject (▲) or **F12** or **mouse button** or **trackpad button**: Eject removable media, such as an optical disc.
